Lightbox Art

Lightboxes are made by carefully cutting and joining pieces of wood to create a frame structure that an electrical circuit can be placed within to create a bulb that illuminate the box from behind. A translucent surface is then placed on the front and artwork can be drawn directly onto this surface. When the light shines through the art work, it illuminates key parts of the piece and creates a striking contrast of light and shade. Lightbox art can be seen in streets and public areas across the world, especially in places such as airports and train stations.

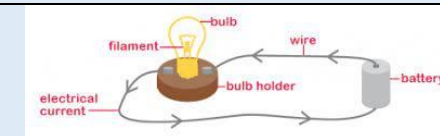

Strengthen and support with additional material



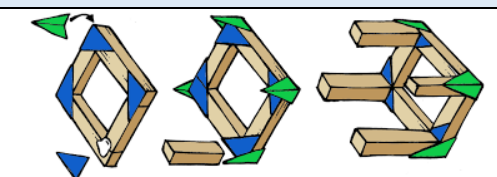
